Last Sunday evening, the quiet little city of Leesburg was thrown into a terrible excitement by an altercation that took place between Mr. Bush Hart and Mr. Thos. Dillion. We have not learned the cause of the difficulty, and all that is known came through Dr. Hillman, who it seems informed Mr. Hart that Dillion intended to attack him as soon as he met him. Mr. Hart prepared himself for a meeting, and it came off last Sunday evening, when firing immediately began. If we are correctly informed, Mr. Dillion commenced firing first, and having emptied his

pistol, ran into the house of Dr. S. P. Hillman, but was pursued, and received a ball in his thigh, from the pistol of Mr. Hart. Several shots were fired at Mr. Dillion, one of which we regret to learn passed through the body of Dr. Hillman. It is feared that it may prove fatal. Mr. Hart was not hurt. Mr. Hart is a son of Wm. Hart, Esq., an old and respectable citizen of Leesburg, and young Hart is a quiet, sober man. We do not know Mr. Dillion.

The colored people hereabouts have been badly hit not shamefully treated by their radical white brethren. The federalists visited this county and took all the able bodied black men they could find and forced them into their army and promised them everything, but done nothing. During the war many a colored soldier was killed and died at this place, and was buried in the cemetery, and there they lay yet, and are likely to lay for all time to come, so far as the radical republicans are concerned, for they don't believe in a dead nigger when they can get plenty of live ones to work on. Not long since the Federal Government ordered, (that is if we are correctly informed,) all soldiers, white and black, to be taken up from the cemetery in this place, and put in the national burying ground at Lexington. All the white soldiers have been taken away, but the colored people have been left in the ground. All the white federal soldiers have had head-stones placed to their graves, the colored people have had none. That is a hard and uncharitable way to treat a poor colored soldier, certain.

Criminal Court.—The fall term of the Harrison Criminal Court has been in session during the past week, Hon. Wm. E. Arthur presiding. There were about 75 cases upon the docket, the majority of which were continued, because the defendants were not found. The crimes charged ranged from murder down to the lowest grades of crime known to the law. Two men were charged with stealing three bushels of corn, but fortunately for them the jury found them not guilty. Several persons were found guilty of carrying concealed and deadly weapons. To this fruitful source of evil, in our land, the Judge in his instructions to the Grand Jury, particularly called attention, and the great wonder is, that the number found guilty is not multiplied by ten. Various other fines were assessed for misdemeanors, ranging from twenty to fifty dollars. The only person found guilty of a felony at this term, was George Danman, who was sentenced to one year's confinement in the penitentiary, for stealing a coat worth ten dollars, but his imbecility of mind was so clearly marked and so fully substantiated by witnesses, that the Jury in a body recommended him to the executive clemency of the Governor, who forthwith sent him a pardon, requesting him to "go and sin no more." This is perhaps the first person in the state towards whom the newly installed Governor has thought proper to exercise his pardoning power—and we understand that his excellency has announced that no pardons will be granted unless the application comes strongly recommended from the court where the case was tried. The case of John Curry in which this commonwealth has felt such an interest has been removed by change of venue to the county of Pendleton, to the jail of which county the prisoner has been removed. It will be remembered that this case went to the Court of Appeals upon the question of an instruction given to the Jury by Judge Arthur, where it was reversed and sent back for new trial. John thinking he could not get a fair trial in this county, applied for change of venue, which was granted.
